Caballeros History 1963

Well we completed our first undefeated season in 1962 and looking forward to a possible repeat for 1963. We were finally finished with the arguments that some of our drums did not have bottom heads and therefore were not really percussion instruments. Glad that was over.

We made some changes in our soprano section regarding the floating soloists. Don Angelica left the horn line and became assistant to Joe Genaro as instructor and arranger. I was given his position as a floater. A new soprano bugler came to use from the IN THIS ISSUE

They did it again. The Caballeros won their 10th DCA Championship. For those of you that are keeping track of the years, that's

1970, 1972, 1973, 1974, 1976, 1984, 1985, 1995, 2003 and 2021.

2021 was a very strange year due to Covid restrictions. The DCA kept the interest alive in the all-age ranks by allowing the contests to take place virtually. I applaud DCA for coming up with this idea. No telling how many corps would have folded if the lack of competition would have spanned two years.

The corps created videos of their performances and submitted them each week to

Skyliners named Harry Hazelwood, and George Del-Monte remained a floater so now we had "The Three Caballeros" floating and doing their improvised drill for every song we played.

We kept up our winning wavs until about mid season when we ended up in second place a half point behind the Skyliners at the Barnum Festival in Bridgeport. That was a message that we have to start concentrating more on our show at every practice, otherwise everything went well until the NJ State Legion Contest in Wildwood when Georgie boy broke his horn. Probably he was blowing too hard. He did not realize it until the last note of "Johnny One Note."As the three of us did our about face to go to position for the exit, George told our trio that his horn broke and did not know what to do. Now George had a solo in the exit song and he was concerned about not being able to play at all.

DCA. Then a slate of judges would view the videos and critique each corps as if it were a live performance. Perfect? No! Adequate, for now!

Some corps chose not to participate in this year's plan for one reason or another which brings me to another point.

The Reading Buccaneers were the defending champions coming into this past season. The 2020 competition schedule was cancelled due to the pandemic, so their 1st place finish in 2019 was the last official championship win.

I've heard some people say that there should be an asterisk next to the Caballeros win. I have a huge problem with this statement. The Buccaneers, like any corps this year, had the opportunity to choose to participate or not participate in this sea-It was their choice not to participate. The Caballeros won going against the corps available to perform in the **Championship contest.**

For example: in 1968, the Caballeros decided not to go to the Nationals. The Sunrisers went to New Orleans and won that show. Should there be an asterisk next to the **Sunrisers because not every** corps participated in the Of course not! contest? They beat every other corps in that contest. The Caballeros beat every other corps at the Championship this year as well as beating every corps in every contest they were in this year. An undefeated season.

The next series of events came to me cold turkey as the saying goes.

I told George to take his mouthpiece out of the horn and put it in his sash, and when I say go, he should with his left hand reach over and take my bugle and at the same time I will reach over with my left hand and hopefully grab his horn and that he should swing it over for me to grab it. Now, although we did not move our heads while talking, we had to speak up due to the percussion section playing. Wouldn't you know that the judge would catch George talking and hit him twice "talking in ranks." Guess who gave a loud talk when we left the field. Jimmy Cos got on George's back for the 2 tenths for talking.

In the meantime, when we brought up our horns to play the exit, I immediately found what was wrong with his horn. The spring

on the first spit valve broke, so all I did was keep it closed for the whole song. As we crossed the finish line I yelled to George that I fixed his broken horn and that I will play my solo at the end with his broken horn. It played beautifully.

The American Legion Nationals was held in Miami. This time not in the Orange Bowl but in the large Miami Municipal Stadium which was built for baseball similar to Roosevelt Stadium in Jersev City. We were delayed in getting on the starting line as we were told to stay in the bus till the rain stopped. We did, and went on about 20 minutes later. I have a CD of that show and we stepped off after rumps in "Espana Cani" at 146 steps per minute.

It turned out to be yet another successful year, winning our 6th National title in a row.

I think the readers of this newsletter would be interested in an article written years ago by former Caballero and Skyliner Bob Bella Rosa. Enjoy!


Our season is done. Did ya win your bets? No matter, it still was a thrilling season.
