I left the corps after the 1963 season after 11 years of marching. However, I still followed the corps to some of the shows. The early 1960's to 1963 seasons with Joe Genaro had brought the Caballeros to the top of the list as far as our winning ways, beating all the corps we competed against. The crowd was always heavy for the Cabal-Although we only leros. had one undefeated year, we seldom lost more than one or two contests per season.

of corps that would select their own judges, and the Caballeros were not allowed to join the DCA. Also, the following year, same group would not appear at a contest if the Caballeros were entered in that contest. There was no doubt that the lowest move they could make was putting themselves ahead of the crowd and the organizations that were running the show. They did not however, withdraw from the major shows like the Dream and a few others.

In 1964 and 1965 the Caballeros won most contests with only a few losses. In all contests, none of their competition were DCA member corps.

In 1966, the Caballeros were allowed to join the DCA. After having lost several contests that year, the Caballeros spent much of Nationals week at the American Legion convention in Washington DC bringing the marching up to what could only be the best.

I was twelve years old, living in the small town where I grew up in southern New Jersey. We had eaten dinner and my parents and I were sitting in the living room, listening to Christmas music by the light of the tree and the plastic candlesticks that shone in each window of the house. Each one held a small vellowish-orange bulb. It was the extent of our electric Christmas display, but the "candles" looked nice from the street - sort of homey and oldfashioned, and because we kept the other lights off in every room to highlight the candles' effect, it gave the house a special, warm glow that was unique to this time of the year. I loved it. Rooms that were ordinary and familiar in the davtime became small wonderlands. Between the lights and the smell of the Scotch real pine (festooned with decorations and tinsel), I was in Christmas heaven. I suppose the presents under the tree didn't hurt either!

The horn and percussion lines spent extra time in sections and full ensemble practice in order to bring the show performance up to their famous winning style. Once in uniform on the field, the magic of that famous Caballero uniform kicked in. The Caballeros presented their greatest performance of 1966 and won the Legion National title by little more than a point. However, two of the leading corps in the show did not agree with the judges and showed their dissatisfaction with judges by passing in retreat without playing. One corps even threw their drum sticks at the judges.

The two corps who thought they would win and did not feel the Caballeros were worth worrying about, were the NY Skyliners and Connecticut Hurricanes. They had lost sight of their goals, whereas the Caballeros had their eyes on only one thing, that was doing the job to win the show.

That has always been the Caballeros goal, to aim for first prize regardless what corps were there and how great they were supposed to be.

The 1968 and 1969 Caballeros did not do well in scoring high marks, placing 3rd and 4th in shows most of the season. However, in 1970, the "Bull broke out of its barn" and started to win shows including their first DCA Championship. In the 70's, the Bull became a fierce monster and stayed out of the barn going undefeated in 1973 and winning 5 DCA Championships within the decade. The Caballeros won the 1976 DCA by almost 6 points, a point spread record that still stands to this day. And thus, the other corps were back to finding it very difficult to beat the Caballeros. much for starting their own association and picking their own judges. You could say that the Bull got its revenge in a very fashionable way as the Caballeros continued to dominate the DCA and were winning more DCA titles.


