# 1966: A Strange and Different Season of Change

From the start, the 1966 season began as one of change for the Caballeros. For the first time since 1958, the corps was not the defending American Legion National Champions, having lost to the Rochester Crusaders in Portland in 1965. After the '65 season, the corps also had joined the Drum Corps Associates, following a two-year absence from that organization. In an effort to regain their Legion Title and stature in the senior drum corps world, and to bring a new sound to the Caballeros in their 20th Anniversary year, Truman Crawford was hired as the music arranger. immediate noticeable change at early stage exhibitions was the absence of the "Rumps" to open or close the show for the first time in many years. 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## Caballeros: A Band Of

Drum Corps Brothers

How did the Hawthorne Caballeros become the greatest drum and bugle corps in this country and for 75 years continue to entertain the crowd and eventually become known around the world?

My name is Michael J Del Vecchio and I first joined the Caballeros in September of 1952. I went in as a French horn player and then in February of 1953, I was moved into the 1st soprano section. I was awed by the way the members treated every new man that came into the corps. They would help them whenever it was needed. It was like they were a band of drum

conducted, concertized fanfare and it was reprised at the end.

Only the color presentation of "Valencia" was retained from the previous year. "Granada" was the new concert number. Other music choices that some questionable deemed were, "Chim-Chim-Cheree" (from Mary Poppins), George Gershwin's "I've Got Plenty of Nothing" from Porgy and Bess, and an exit medley of "Nobody Knows You When You're Down and Out" and "Second Hand Rose," both from the musical, Funny Girl. These were not your typical Caballero music selections! How would fans react to this new sound, and how would the corps fare with this new repertoire?

Competing now in DCA, the corps would face DCA's "big three:" the Hurricanes, Skyliners and Buccaneers, as well as the other DCA members for the first time since 1964. would prove to be a bit of a "roller coaster season" from the beginning. In Stratford CT, the Cabs placed a solid second to the Hurricanes. the first show, subtle adjustments were being made to the music program almost weekly. The corps won in Toronto

against the Rochester Crusaders, but dropped to third behind the Hurcs and Sky at Mission Drums, the first meeting with the three top DCA corps. By the fourth contest in Syracuse, the "Rumps" were back, and the corps returned to the winner's circle over the More music Sunrisers. changes were made as the season wore on, with adjustments to the start of "Valencia," and the biggest one of all, scrapping the exit in mid-season. The medley of Funny Girl tunes was out, and "Strangers In the Night," a more traditional Hawthorne -type of replaced exit number them.

Despite music changes and drill execution improvement, the corps struggled in July and into August with a fourth place in Baltimore, then three consecutive seconds and a fourth place at the Dream. However, even with just two first place wins, during the season the corps had in fact beaten every other major DCA corps at least once, with the exception of the New York Skyliners who beat them the three times they met. Things were not looking particularly good heading into late August and the Legion Nationals in Washington D.C., but Jimmy Costello continued his typical relentless pursuit of excellence and morale was still high. The goal was to go to the Nationals and as Jimmy would often say: "Do a job so good that they CAN'T take it away from us!" So, it was on to D.C. to attempt to regain the title.

The big story of 1966 was the American Legion Nationals in Washington, D.C. The corps was told to arrive in Washington on Friday, August 26, before the contest weekend, determined to do whatever we could to give our best performance of the season. The Preliminaries were scheduled for Saturday, so the corps was instructed to be in D.C. in time for a Friday evening rehearsal. The evening rehearsal turned into a near allnighter as we drilled and worked music until past midnight. If we didn't win this National Championship, least we would know we did everything in our power to do the best we could.

We boarded the buses for the Prelims on Saturday morning, with a quiet confidence about the task ahead. The preliminary contest was held at a high school field in rural Vir-

ginia outside of D.C. Following inspection, the corps took the field and did the best job of the season. When the dust settled (literally!), we emerged as the winners with a score of 81.60 over the Hurricanes in second with 80.53 and the Skyliners in third with 79.95. They were followed by the Rochester Crusaders, Yankee Rebels and Sunrisers (the Buccaneers were not a Legion corps). We had accomplished the first step in our mission!

There was no celebration just vet. Jimmy Cos wouldn't let down now, with another National Championship within our grasp. He reminded us that we would "get no gifts" from the judges, and would have to do an even better job in the finals on Sunday night if we were going to win it all. In true Caballero (and Costello) fashion, virtually all of Saturday until nearly midnight, and most of Sunday was devoted to drill rehearsal and a final music rehearsal Sunday afternoon to work the concert. We boarded the buses for the ride to the Finals at D.C. Stadium, and then stopped at a field for one final non-playing drill run -through! Jimmy was leaving nothing to chance and no opportunity missed. Someone later claimed the corps rehearsed over 25 hours between Friday and Sunday night.

The result was the Caballeros won a narrow victory in the Finals by just .117 over the Hurricanes, and regained the American Legion National Championship. The Skyliners dropped to fourth behind the Crusaders. was the eleventh American Legion Title for the Caballeros. The retreat was a "roller coaster" story of its own. The Skyliners and Hurricanes in particular were upset with the results. The traditional "Pass in Review" for the junior corps champion Chicago Cavaliers went off without any problems. The senior portion was far different. Sky marched off in protest to a drum tap, without playing, and carrying their shakos. Drumsticks were hurled in the direction of the judges and Legion officials. The Hurricanes were a bit more dignified in their protest as they marched off and then played their entire show routine at the end of the field, blocking our exit, although their high horn trophy was smashed on the field.

The season was all but over after the Nationals. The DCA Championship was held in Bridgeport on September

24th. That night, the corps did a terrific job, as good as, if not better than the Legion performance. We had no illusions of winning that show, but few could have predicted the outcome: fifth - our worst placement of the entire season. The Skyliners won, followed by the Hurricanes, Buccaneers, and even the Sunrisers, who defeated the Caballeros that night for the first time ever in their history. 1966 was indeed, a strange season!

corps brothers. This perhaps was the result of military training. their They had to work with their buddies and each watch out for the other when in combat, also the way they worked on their music and on drill night, how they worked to perfect their marching. was indeed proud to be a member of such a drum and bugle corps. After 11 years marching and playing with the Caballeros I had to leave.

I often thought and wondered how this comradery between members came about. As the St. George's Jr. Drum Corps, they were a top contender and at contests the toughest corps to beat was The Grand Street Boys from New York. So these young bovs knew what was needed to become a winner. They were also sponsored by the Hawthorne Post 199, and when you look at the photo of them together on

the steps of St George's Church, you can see a group of boys who are proud of their corps.



WWII started and eventually these boys left to serve their country in the armed forces of the U.S.

It is now 1946, and most all the members who survived the war have returned home and are now thinking about drum corps. would be that they would gather to form a Sr. drum and bugle corps. That they did, and at the home of the Costello family, a meeting was held and they formed a drum and bugle corps. Their first name was American Legion Post 199 Sr. Drum and Bugle Corps. They knew this was only temporary. As more former St. George's men retuned from the armed service and found out their former Corps mates were forming a drum corps, they came to the post to join. marched in their service uniforms, but they knew that soon they would decide on a uniform and name for their new drum corps.



In my first year, I tried to find out why their actions toward new members was so friendly and why they were eager to become friends and help you with your music and drill. After vears I often had thoughts about my experience with the Caballeros. It was one of the dominant reasons that helped the Caballeros become a dynasty in the drum and bugle corps world. I mean in my 11 years we won 8 American Legion National titles, and 11 New Jersey Legion titles. Actually, the Caballeros won the first state title in 1949 by beating the Jersey Joes who were the **Legion National Champs** for that year.

What would keep any man who came to the Caballe-

ros from another senior corps after marching with that corps for 6 years and stay with the Caballeros for 35 years. Many men spent almost as much time before leaving and did not go to another corps other than going to teaching junior corps.

It appears my first statement in the early part of this page was correct. They were "A drum corps band of brothers." They were a family and every new member was greeted as another member of the family known as the Hawthorne Caballeros. made a statement in 1946 that stunned the Sr. Drum corps world by not being a cadet style corps but to be a totally uniquely different and independent thinking drum corps. They all voted to wear a Spanish style uniform, play Spanish style music and call them-CABALLEROS. selves They reinforced this feeling by winning the N J State title in 1949. They won their first Legion National in 1951 and by the mid 50's, let it be known that the Caballeros were not only for real but were out to beat every corps they competed against. In my mind this all resulted in being a "DRUM CORPS BAND OF BROTHERS" to the end.
