Military Funeral For A Passing Veteran

Few people know or understand what really happens after the death of veteran, and know this special event is handled by the members of the Military Guard of Honor.

My name is Michael J. Del Vecchio. I am with a unit called BUGLES ACROSS AMERICA and we provide buglers to play "Live" Taps at funerals when called upon by the funeral service. have been the bugler numbers of times. Most military groups only have 2 members to handle the ceremony which includes handling the folding of the flag, and presenting the folded flag to the selected relative.

The Honor may be either first, or at the completion of the final blessing.

Once the hearse arrives. the driver will stop as close to the path used by the people arriving. The casket will be carried out feet first and will remain that way until it reaches the area close to the site burial. The of Honor Guard will usually follow the casket to the grave site and will then seek the proper place for them to stand at attention until it is time to spread the flag, refold the flag, and be sure the fold is correct. The flag's final fold is a blue field with white stars showing. There shall be no red of the flag exposed. At the same time the bugler will also take his place 20 to 30 feet from the burial site.

However, if the blessing is done at a church, and the entrance to the church is led by the priest, the deceased will follow the priest into the church head first, with a holy cloth laid over the casket.

Once the services are completed, the casket will be turned around and the American flag opened and laid on the casket. The procession will then move

We met in kindergarten. Over the years we did everything together.

out of the church with the casket, head first led by the priest out the main entrance and it will be placed in the hearse for transport to the grave site for the military service. An American flag is draped over the casket of the deceased Service members and Veterans to honor their service to America. The flag is placed so that the blue field with stars is at the head and over the left shoulder of the deceased. At the same time, the bugler is moving to his position, some 20 to 30 feet from the casket, and he positions himself so he can see the casket. The orders are the bugler will face the casket for the playing of "Live" Taps. At a sign from the commander of the honor guard, the bugler will commence to play "Live" Taps.

Should the bugler turn away from the group at the funeral and raise his bugle slightly higher, than his instrument has a recording and not playing "Live" Taps. After Taps has been played, the flag is meticulously folded thirteen times by members of the honor guard. When the flag is completely folded, the stars point upwards, which remind Americans of their national motto, In "God We

Trust". When folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a tricornered hat, reminding Americans of the soldiers who under General served George Washington, and the sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the United States Armed Forces. No red or white stripe is to be evident, leaving only the blue field with stars.

An honor guard member, representing one of the branches of the United States Armed Forces, presents the flag to the next of kin. The presenter, if possible, a member of the same service of the deceased, will lean forward while presenting the folded flag, with the straight edge of the flag facing the recipi-The presenter then ent. recites the following words, which was standardized on April 20, 2012.

"On behalf of the President of the United States, the United States (Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force or Coast Guard), whichever branch is appropriate, and a grateful nation, please accept this flag as a symbol of our appreciation for your loved one's honorable and faithful service."

The symbolism in the Flag Folding Ceremony explained:

Fold One: Life on earth.

Fold Two: Eternal life.

Fold Three: The veteran who gave a portion of his/ her life for the defense of the United States.

Fold Four: Humanity's weaker nature and American reliance on God in peace and war times.

Fold Five: Tribute to the United States.

Fold Six: The state of the American's heart.

Fold Seven: The United States Armed Forces.

Fold Eight: Tribute to the one who entered the valley of the shadow of death that humanity might see the light of day.

Fold Nine: A tribute to Motherhood.

Fold Ten: A tribute to Fatherhood.

Fold Eleven: For the Jewish citizen, it represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon & glorifies the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

Fold Twelve: For the Christian citizen, represents eternity and glorifies God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

He got married as I did and he moved to PA. Somehow he ran into Mike Kruse who lived there also. They became good friends. Mike was in the Cabs and Roger followed soon after.

It was a treat for me to see Roger at some of the shows after that. We would talk about old times when we were kids and where the future would bring us. For him it was to the competing corps and me to the Alumni Corps.

One day for reasons I never knew, Roger came to the Alumni Corps. It really felt great marching in the same corps again with my good friend. As priorities change in our lives, it became time for Roger to move on.

We would chat on the phone from time to time but that came to a stop after awhile.

One day at a rehearsal

for a show in PA, Paul Bongiovi gave me the news that Roger had passed on. I went over to Mike and we wept for our friend.

Just a few months ago Mike Kruse told me that Roger's wife had passed away. Knowing they had no kids I asked about the remains of this couple. I was told that they were both cremated and a close neighbor had them. Mike's concern was evident and he procured their remains.

I asked Mike if I might have a small amount of Roger's ashes. I wanted to scatter them in the ocean in Asbury Park where Roger and I grew up together.

During Camp Weekend last week, Mike called me over to his car and gave me a small bag containing Roger's ashes.


